CLUB CHAMPIONSHIP

Simon Lee won the 2 game play-off against Tony Clark (for the record, by 2-0) and thus becomes the youngest player to hold the title. This distinction was previously held by the late David Wood who won in 1965/6 at the age of 16, and who retained the title the following year, before going to University. Simon is still only 14. 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OPENING NIGHT - CATERPILLAR SIMULTANEOUS

George Fernie is apparently the culprit for this idea, proposed at the A.G.M. as a means of opening the season. George explained later that his proposal was made tongue—in—cheek, but as often happens with such proposals this one was carried with all seriousness.

Of course, for some seasons we have opened with a tandem simul by the Champion and the holder of the David Wood Trophy but with a tie for both positions (the Championship as then unresolved), to repeat the idea meant our very own gang of four, namesly Simon Lee, Tony Clark, Edward Lee and Stuart Skelsey.

There were some sceptics, who thought the quartet wouldn't combine sufficiently well to withstand the opposition, but these were silenced when the caterpillar turned into a butterfly that stung like a bee. They took on 24 opponents and allowed just 5 wins, by J. Duggan, S. Bradford, R. Wagstaff, A. O'Regan and S. Bendon. Draws were secured by W. Franklin, S. Leary, G. Fernie and K. Jones to give the caterpillar and excellent score of 17-7.

Whether the new League Secretary had some inside information is open to speculation, but he couldn't have picked a keener contest for both sides to open the season. Over the years in Essex League matches we have

built a keen rivalry with the Hammers, but met them for only the second time in the London League last season, when they took the points by $6\frac{1}{2}-3\frac{1}{2}$. Moreover, our new captain Alan Potter, with his recent East Ham connections, must have been doubly anxious to reverse last year's result and pulled together a good side. Perhaps however, this encounter had more to do with W & W - Upminster meetings; six of the opposition being Upminster players. Indeed 5 of them appeared for Upminster against us in our final Essex League match last season.

The scoresheet suggests a very tight centest, which is just what it was, with wins hard to come by. Dave Hick was on course for our first success but finished $\frac{1}{2}$ pt light when he let slip a two pawn advantage by playing a combination in the wrong order. Terry Whitton committed a howler in the early stages and was faced with a long defensive task, the exchange down, to save a half. At length he accomplished this feat by use of an outside passed pawn. Paul Pritchard had technical difficulties in holding on to an extra pawn and parted with two minor pieces for a rook and a second pawn. The outcome was unclear and doubtless would have required a second session to play out. But Paul was due almost upon the instant to take up a place at Exeter University for a Teacher Training course, and proposed the draw. What would have happened if Nixon had elected to play on, the opposition wondered. "I'd have come back for it" was Paul's answer. Alan Potter tried to lead his team by example when crashing through Smyth's king's-side, but no-one has yet been able to follow. We thought Graham Speed was going to add to that point in the top board game which drew a sizeable crowd as it boiled up in a time scramble. The players had castled on opposite sides and Graham had broken through to the king. But the attack was deceptively difficult to press home and Bill Stirling (formerly among our ranks) whipped up a counter on the opposite wing where none seemed to exist.

So all square at adjournment. Alan Marshall was making disparaging noises about his position but later found a resource to save himself. Edward Lee's game creates the most interest: after successfully negotiating a most difficult middlegame he moved onto the attack but in order to keep this going has offered the exchange. Roy Watts contributed to the drama by electing to seal his next move, keeping everyone on tenter hooks as to whether he'd accepted or declined the sac. We still don't know! Simon Lee has built a powerful position with an enormous supported passed pawn on KR6, but has still to breakthrough. Meanwhile, Stuart Skelsey battled on until move 70 by which time he had reached an ending of Q & P v. Q where his lone RP was too far back to win.

Ultimate victory in this match will owe as much to the defensive tasks of Whitton and Marshall as to the wins.

Finally, if there are still any suspicious minds, let me state the result of this tournament is not at all to do with having had my finger in the pairing pie. Indeed I think the blame should lie fairly and squarely with Bill Franklin as our last round game shows:
